By James L. Emery HOME HEATING FUEL SALES TAKEN TO THE COURTS

The Tax Law of New York State statutorily exempts from taxation "ail products constanted by humans for the preservation of health." On this basis, several Re-

health." On this basis, several Republican assemblymen are planning a lawsuit against the state for a refund of the sales tax paid on home heating fuels.

The whole idea of challenging the legality of the home heating fuels sales tax began when Assemblman Larry Lane of Windham, formerly requested a refund on the sales tax paid on home heating fuels for his own home. His rethe sales tax paid on home heating fuels for his own home. His request was denied on the grounds that home heating fuels did not fit the description of a product needed for the preservation of one's health. Assemblyman-Lanhas been granted a public hearing on the question, however, at which time he and his attorney will present scientific evidence supporting his case. If this move fails, a lawsuit will be filed in State Supreme Court.

The people of this state should

The people of this state should not be burdened by a tax on items such as fuel oil which, when used for home consumption during the winter months, is an absolute necessity for the preservation of health. Governor Carey releated from his steadfast oppositior to this tax repeal and allowed for a partial two per cent reduction by 1981. But this is not enough. The payment of any saies tax on home heating fue's is unjust and discuminatory.

Full repeal of the home heating fuels sales tax could save families in the state as much as \$160 million. It would be of particular relief to senior citizens and those on fixed incorrect who have a difficult

lief to senior citizens and those on fixed incomes who have a difficult time meeting their skyrocketing utility bills.

There are indications that the planned lawsuit will be receiving even more widespread support. Thousands of state residents signed petitions earlier this year backing full repeal of the home heat-ing fuels sales tax and their leg-islators have the responsibility to see that their wishes are carried

We have been temporarily delayed by the stubborn resistance of the governor and the Democrat-controlled Assembly, but, as the spring goes, we have just begun to

fight.
