"Inside The State Capital" By James L. Emery

A number of weeks ago, I noted that Assembly Republican Leader Perry Durives and I had introduced a package of three bills to shappy limit tax increases in New York

Today, weeks later, I must seport to you that these very same bills, mysteriously, have never been printed. This is most curious since other bills introduced after our town in this produced after

since other bills introduced after our tax limiting measures were printed almost immediately.

The facts are frees. On July 13, the bills were properly filed with the Assembly clerks. It was our hope, the bills bould be printed and ready for consideration twisn-ever the Legislature reconvened to take up its unfinished legislative

take up its untraisined legislauve business.

On August 1, we took notice that the tax limiting measures still had not been printed and the Legislature was scheduled to reconvene on August 8. We further noticed that bills introduced after ours had been printed. In fact, one bill filed on July 24 was printed on July 26.

The question is — What is holding up the Duryea-Emery tax limitation measures?

The three bills currently being held hostage in the Assembly are:

The three bills currently being held hostage in the Assembly are: (1) designed to but the brakes on state and local tax increases, (2) to begin a process of reexamination of state mandates which have forced local taxes to increase even higher and (3) to amend the State Constitution to require two-thirds majority for the approval of any new taxes or increases in rates of existing taxes.

new taxes of increases in rates of existing taxes.

These tax limiting measures when tied to our proposal for a 20 per cent, \$2.2 billion tax cut, constitute a hard-hitting and responsible approach to cap and reverse the state's tax and spend spiral.

But now we find these tax limit-But now we find these tax limiting measures, introduced by Republicans, curjously held up by the State Assembly, which is controlled by Governor Carey's New York City Democrat colleagues.

York City Democrat colleagues.

Permanent tax reduction, compled with tight state expenditure controls are exactly what is needed to rebuild a sound New York State economy. I sincerely hope that politics is not blocking the chances for enacting these necessary measures.
