SED Announces 1978-79 Eligibility Criteria For Participation In School Food Service Program

The State Education Department today announced family eligibility criteria for determining the eligibility of students to receive free and reduced price meals, under the National School Lunch Program, the School Breakfast Program, and free milk under the Special Milk Program during the 1978-79 school year. The standards are established annually by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Program regulations specify that each local school food authority shall, at the beginning of the school year, publicly announce the family-size eligibility standards it has adopted for use in determining eligibility for free and reduced price meals, explains Richard O.

Reed, chief of the Department's Bureau of School Food Management.

Under this legislation, schools participating in the reimbursed programs are required to serve free and reduced meals and free milk to all children from families whose total gross income is at or below the applicable income level, upon receiving an application from the family. Participation in the reimbursed National School Lunch School Breakfast and Special Milk Programs is available at the option of local public school boards, non-public and private school administrators and residential child caring institutions. The table of eligibility standards follows:

Income in this context does not include income used for the following hardship conditions which could not be reasonably anticipated or controlled by the household:

- * Unusually high medical expenses.
 - * Shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income.
 - * Special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child.
 - * Disaster or casualty losses.
- In applying guidelines, school food administrators must consider

either the income of the family during the past 12 months or the family's current rate of income, whichever is the better indicator of the need for free and reduced price meals. A recently unemployed family member may be cause for the family eligibility to change. Such causes shall be considered throughout the school year.

The Andover Central School Board of Education adopted the above criteria for use at ACS during '78-79. Forms will be sent to all families in September.
