

**GREENWOOD NEWS**

At the Town Board Meeting Monday, it was voted 4-1 to take all necessary steps to re-open the Rogers Road from its intersection with Township Route 2 South to Township Route 417 in a condition to be approved by the State as an active road. Mrs. York, Clerk was instructed to send notices to the property owners adjacent to the road and request Neil McCormick to remove the fence across the right-of-way.

Highway Superintendent, Ed Mullen, reported to the Board that the Donovan Road Project is finished on the Colby Creek Road off the Canisteo-Greenwood Route 248. The Highway Crew is back at work on the Wheeler Hill Road. Mr. Mullen said a new sluice has been put in near the Town Line Road on Norton Hollow Road and steel retaining along that road has been set up along the creek bank. Now the creek bed is about four feet lower than when the wall was originally installed. Rip Rap has been added to control water. The Crew will work on the Dryden Hill Road this season.

The Town Hall has been re-roofed at a cost of \$723 said Supervisor John Helgerson. Members discussed repainting the ceiling in the Town Hall.

The Public Health Nursing Service requested and received permission to use the medical facilities in the Town Hall for the Well Child Clinic, as long as they keep the Hall in satisfactory condition.

Mr. Helgerson said Insurance costs on the Liability policies held by the Town have increased and the agent, A. Nelson Henry, would attend a meeting and explain the policies.

Constable Robert Malin requested that quarantine be placed on the Park in the center of the Village. No action was taken.

The School Board of Education met Monday night. They accepted the resignation of Ernie Kuratomi, Teacher for the State-Funded Pupil with Special Educational Needs Program. He plans to re-

turn to Coudersport, Pa., to teach. Carol Stone and Louise Smith were approved for non-teaching substitute list. The Board also approved last year's substitute list for the coming year. Principal Donald Gooley was granted permission to attend the New York State Council of State Dist. Administrators, September 24, at Grossingers. Edward Degnan of Canisteo, was named School Attorney and the free and reduced lunch and special milk policy of the school was announced. The Board approved salaries for both teaching and non-teaching staff and Cafeteria petty cash.

Monday, August 14, the Senior Citizens and friends from Andover Jasper, Canisteo and Hornell, enjoyed a trip to the Canadian side of Niagara Falls. Due to misunderstandings and slowness of the Dispatcher, the people were at the meadow Parking Lot to go at 8 A. M., and the Blue Bird Bus did not arrive until 10 A. M. After pick-up stops in Canisteo and Hornell to complete 49 passengers, the trip was a success. The group attended the Marine Land Show, saw the Falls and Botanical Gardens and stopped at a Ponderosa Restaurant at Lockport on the way home. The trip was made possible by a gift of \$200 from the Town.

Tuesday, August 8, Greenwood Central's FFA team won 3rd overall, competing with 49 teams from Ohio, New York and Pa., in the Ninth Annual Dairy Judging Conference, sponsored by Alfred Ag-Tech College. The Team was also first among 35 New York State Teams. The Team, Coached by Sheldon Atherton, was: Ron Warriner, Mike Putnam, Tom Harkenrider and Laverne Warriner. There were four on the Team, but only scores of the top 3 were used. Greenwood tied at 1605 with Mt. Markham High of West Winfield. Greenwood was awarded Third on the basis of a higher score by its alternate. The Teams visited and judged four dairy farms in Wyoming County. There were 190 individuals in the contest in which participants judged 10 classes - 2 of Jerseys, 2 of Guernseys and 6 of Holsteins. Best score of a New Yorker was Gary DeMann, 573 of Troupsburg, which gave him 5th Place. Ron Warriner 561, was 7th Place Winner.

**STATE OVERSPENDING MAY MEAN A TAX INCREASE**

This year, 1978, is the year when our nation saw the passage of Proposition 13 in California. This California ballot issue was a tax revolt overwhelmingly supported by the citizens of California. It also should serve as a warning to government leaders throughout the nation that people are fed up with the seemingly endless upward spiral of more government spending and increased taxes.

In New York State, a state where taxes of all kinds are assessed at much higher levels than in California, some state lawmakers are working to reduce taxes and spending. Led by Assembly Republican Leader Perry Duryea, two separate efforts have been mounted to finally end New York's history as the highest taxed state in the nation.

One effort calls for the reduction of state taxes by \$2.2 billion, or 20 per cent of the 1977-78 tax levy. The second proposal calls for limiting all future tax increases of state and local governments.

While these proposals have been hailed by citizen taxpayer groups, labor leaders and business organizations, they have not made much progress in the state law-making process unfortunately. The reason - they do not fit in with the current Carey Administration plans of continued high spending for New York State.

New York State expenditure levels reached an all-time high in 1978 with the addition of nearly \$1 billion in new state spending in the Carey 1978-79 state budget. Since the enactment of that budget, and the California adoption of Proposition 13, the requests by Governor Carey for more state spending have not subsided.

A study just completed shows that New York State will face a \$900 million problem if the Governor's additional spending proposals and promises are approved.

After begrudgingly agreeing to cut taxes this year, the governor is now promising and proposing all sorts of exotic and expensive programs that all of us would have to pay for with increased taxes next year.

The taxpayers of this state are demanding lower taxes. There simply isn't any way for taxes to be permanently reduced unless spending is permanently reduced. This is a plain and simple fact.

And yet, our governor keeps on going in the old way of promising and spending. If he has his way, a gigantic tax increase seems very likely in 1979. That is a very disturbing thought.
