## "Inside The State Capital"

By James L. Emery RURAL TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS DESERVE ATTENTION

Activeing a balance in the funding and concern for rural transportation problems and urban transportation needs is important to our state's economy and the well-being of state residents.

Assembly Republicans have formed a task to bring rural transportation issues into sharp focus and to present the legislature with a documented report and specific legislative recommendations to deal with existing problems.

documented report documented recommendations to deal with existing problems.

When legislators representing rural districts have raised transportation issues of their respective Assembly Districts, they have met considerable indifference and foothers of the considerable indifference and foothers o considerable indifference and 100th dragging in Albany. Therefore, upstate Republicans have decided to join forces in presenting the facts about a deteriorating rural transportation network in the hope of making rural transportation a much higher priority with the governor and with legislators from the larger metropolitan areas of the state.

To give you a good idea of the

the larger metropolitan areas of the state.

To give you a good idea of the problem, note the following facts. In recent months, a report given by the Department of Transportation (DOT) to the State Legislature revealed that some 500 bridges in New York State were estimated to be structurally deficient, indicating a real potential for danger. This point was brought home by the fact that New York's safety record had dropped from eighth in 1975-75 to 33rd in 1977-78, as compared with other 49 states.

The DOT report also noted that of the state's 5,200 bridges, 1,800 will me over 50 years old in the next 10 years. This indicates a worsening of our already diminished status.

With this in mind, it was bad

With this in mind, it was bad news when on July 28, DOT issued a statement that 34 bridges and highway improvement projects in 24 upstate counties, might have to be postponed due to a lack of funds. The total cost of the 34 projects was anticipated to be \$92.4 million

It was shocking when just a short time later: (1) Governor Carey announced a commitment of \$220 million for New York City subway system improvements and fare subsidies, and (2) plans were revealed to some \$800 millions.

face subsidies, and (2) µlans were revealed to some \$800 million in state and federal funds to be further committed to New York City rapid transit network, including \$122 million to air condition a subsequence.

The point is that more equitable distribution of monies needs to be achieved. That is one of the major reasons why Assembly Republicans formed the Task Force on Rural Transportation and why it is now seeking detailed information from local highway officials throughout the count. of upstate New York
