

Local Burglary Solved Promptly

A local burglary Monday evening was promptly solved within 24 hours with the loot recovered and two alleged culprits in jail by the Andover Police Department with the cooperation of the BCI and New York State Police.

Fotine Norton, proprietor of Karcane's Restaurant on Main St. here in Andover, reported the theft of approximately \$500 in cash, liquor, cigarettes, food and candy to the Andover Police Department on Tuesday morning when she opened up her business place.

"Jim" Graffrath, acting Police Chief, answered the call, made a quick investigation, and then called the Wellsville State Police asking for assistance from the BCI and a fingerprint team.

Robert "Bob" Jackson, a local resident, answered the call promptly and after a joint investigation that lasted part of the day which lead to obtaining a search warrant, the stolen property was recovered from an apartment over "Noah's Ark Restaurant" on Main Street — less than a hundred feet away from the site of the burglary.

According to the Police Blotter Darren "Pinhead" Monahan, aged 16, of Andover, was arrested and lodged in the Allegany County Jail in Belmont and later that evening Michael Hogue, 21, of Hornell, and a transient in the above mentioned apartment, was apprehended in Whitesville in the alleged burglary and is also being held in the County Jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail.

According to Chief Graffrath the investigation is continuing and other arrests may be forthcoming.

We feel that the Village of Andover is very fortunate to have such a fine Police Officer who is not afraid to call in assistance from the State Police to help solve a burglary.

Our place of business was broken into on Monday night which we reported to the Andover Police Tuesday morning as soon as it was discovered. Our Police Chief responded promptly, made his investigation, called in the State Police and BCI to assist him with their technical equipment, and then working together, located the stolen money and recovered it along with the rest of the stolen merchandise. In addition, two of the alleged thieves were apprehended and lodged in jail — all on the same day.

We realize that every burglary can't be solved this quickly, but it should act as a warning to would-be thieves, that Andover is a very poor place for them to carry out their activities.

We would like to express our sincere thanks to the Andover Police, the State Police, and the BCI for their prompt action in our time of need.

1978-79 Tax Rates For Andover Cen. School District

The 1978-79 tax rates for the Andover Central School District are as follows:

Andover — \$77.015 per \$1000 assessment, up \$3.00 from last year

Alfred \$11,954 per \$1000 assessment, down \$.655 from last year

Independence \$33,394 per \$1000 assessment, down \$35.157 from last year

Ward — \$76.324 per \$1000 assessment, down \$15.441 from last year

Wellsville — \$47.188 per \$1000 assessment, down \$4.247 from last year

Greenwood — \$79.049 per \$1000 assessment, down \$1.83 from last year

Tax bills will be issued September 7th and payable without penalty until October 6, 1978. After that date they will be payable with a 2% penalty until October 6, 1978. After this date they will be returned to the County Treasurer for collection.

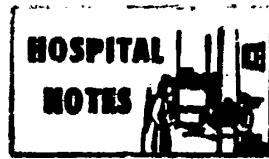

Deer Party Permit Deadline September 11

Hunters filing applications for deer management permits were advised today to pay close attention to instructions before completing their applications. The advisory came from Herb Doig, Director of the Division of Fish and Wildlife in the Department of Environmental Conservation.

Doig said approximately 8 percent of the applications received so far contain more than the required number of individuals, many with preference certificates for the unit they are applying for.

The application folder states — (item 2 on page 7) "Any application containing more members than established will be accepted, but if selected for issuance, permit will include only the names of members up to the correct size". In other words, Doig explained, if four preference certificates are sent in when the required group size is only three, the fourth person will be omitted from the permit, and his preference certificate will be wasted. In addition to losing his opportunity to participate as a member of the party if it is issued this year, the fourth person will lose his eligibility for a preference certificate during the 1979 season.

Doig said apparently hunters are not checking the group size requirements for the various Deer Management Units listed on page 1 of the application form. Group sizes and boundaries have been changed from last season in some cases and it is important that hunters check this information before completing their applications. Hunters are reminded that applications for deer management permits must be post marked not later than September 11.

On another subject, Doig said the new "sportsmen's" license is being enthusiastically received by sportsmen and some license fishing outlets are experiencing shortages of this license. Supplies of the new license are being replenished as soon as possible. The sportsmen's license, available to residents only, covers fishing, small game hunting and big game hunting. It costs \$15.00 which represents a \$2.25 saving over buying all three licenses separately.

Sporting licenses are sold in many sporting goods stores, by village town and county clerks and at Department of Environmental Conservation regional offices.

Doig advised muzzle-loaders that maps showing the areas open to hunting should be available at all license-issuing outlets and Department regional offices by Friday, September 8. A leaflet giving a written description of hunting areas and requirements has been available since mid-August, however, maps were delayed in printing.
