STATE MANAGEMENT COUNCIL NEEDED

Should the government of New York State be run more like a business?

I certainly think so. I seriously doubt a business could survive, if its expenses continued to mount in the face of a shrinking market.

A business, properly run, would not continue to add personnel while its income is being reduced. A good businessman would not retain key personnel while wise, impartial advisors point out gross incompetence.

There are many strong reasons for New York State to take advantage of the best minds in our business community. That's why for two sessions I've joined sponsorship and supported the creation of a State Management Advisory Council to be comprised of state businessmen lending their professional expertise to state government.

Last year, although the State Management Advisory Council passed both houses with bipartisan support, the measure was vetoed by Governor Carey.

This year, I again joined Assembly Republican Leader Perry B. Duryea in sponsoring this most necessary tool to cut government waste and inefficiency.

Why do we need this council now? Because, as you know, the cost of New York State government has continued to climb while the efficiency of state agencies appears to be declining.

Although the state's ability to raise money has been seriously damaged by the loss of people jobs, business and industry, state spending under Governor Carey has gone from \$9 billion to \$12 billion. Approximately 14,500 people have been added to the state employment lists.

Although the Department of Audit and Control has cited the Department of Motor Vehicles, for sloppy administration, poor book-keeping and poor control of state money, and the State Investigations Commission has said the Commissioner must be fired, he's still on the job Governor Carey appointed him to.

Also, in the past 3 1/2 years, 35 new agencies and offices have been formed.

These, I feel, are strong reasons for getting some sound business judgement in state government.

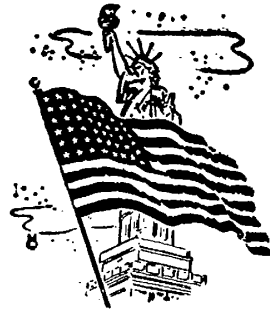
