The people who will head the

"Inside The State Capital"

Home buyers in this state are in a terrible bind.

With banks all across the state — from Long Island to Buffalo — asking down payments as high as 30 to 50 per cent, how can people afford to purchase a home?

The reason of this dilemma is that our 8.5 per cent legal limit on the mortgage rate is the lowest in the nation and it is not competitive in the national money lending market. We're surrounded by states that permit 9.5 and 10 per cent interest on home loans. Something must be done immediately to loosen up loan money for New Yorkers.

The New York State Senate has already passed a measure which would allow New York's mortgage interest rate ceiling to rise to 10 per cent, and then fluctuate, depending upon federal money lending rates.

Unfortunately, this badly needed legislation has never come to a vote in the New York State Assembly, which is controlled by Assembly Speaker Stanley Stein gut of Brooklyn.

It is known that the Brooklyn Assembly leader is involved with a local urban problem regarding neighborhood deterioration. The Speaker has pledged not to permit an Assembly vote on the mortgage rate change unless the Senate passes a bill to force banks to lend mortgage money to poor urban areas.

Both issues — increasing the mortgage ceiling to accelerate the flow of mortgage money to all New Yorkers and the formulation of a cure for urban deterioration — have much merit. However, there is no valid, legitimate reason to tie one to the other.

Urban revitalization is important. Permitting middle income rural residents to buy a home is equally important. Urban revitalization is undoubtedly going to be a long, slow process. Opening up the mortgage market to the general public can be done quickly.

The Assembly should immediately approve the Senate measure on raising the mortgage rate ceiling to more realistic levels.
