

## 1978-79 Small Game Seasons Announced

Details of this Fall's hunting seasons have been announced by Commissioner of Environmental Conservation Peter A. A. Berle. The 1978-79 license year begins on October 1, with licenses and small game hunting guides available at license-issuing agents.

Although most seasons and bag limits are similar to those of recent years, Commissioner Berle noted several changes, including

### Wild Turkeys

Only one annual \$2 permit will be required, valid for both the spring and fall seasons, replacing the \$2 permit for each season. Spring season will be four weeks, increasing from three this year and a larger area will be open. The fall season in central and southeastern New York will be five weeks instead of four.

### Pheasants

Hen pheasants may be taken in Washington County. Season has been lengthened by 20 days in the northernmost counties of Clinton, Franklin and St. Lawrence, permitting additional recreational opportunities on stocked birds that likely would not survive the area's harsh winter conditions.

### Raccoons, Red & Grey Fox

There are other minor changes in seasons for some other game animals, so hunters are advised to carefully read the small game hunting guide issued with their licenses.

Hunting hours generally last from sunrise to sunset. These shooting hours also apply to woodcock, even though it is a migratory bird. For other migratory birds such as ducks and geese, shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Although the \$5 federal duck stamp is not required when hunting woodcock, gallinules, rail or snipe, the shotgun must be plugged to hold not more than three shells. This is the same restriction that applies when hunting ducks and geese.

Although basic license fees are unchanged, a new resident small game fishing license is available for \$15.50, a savings of \$2.25 over the cost of individual licenses. See guide for details. Season dates and bag limits follow:

### Wild Turkey \*\*

October 16 - November 19, in all or portions of Albany, Broome, Chemung, Chenango, Cortland, Delaware, Greene, Madison, Onondaga, Orange, Otsego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Rockland, Schoenectady, Schoharie, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester Counties - 1 per day

October 30 - November 19, in all or portions of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Erie, Essex, Livingston, Rensselaer, Steuben, Warren, Washington and Wyoming Counties - 1 per day

May 7 - June 3, in all portions of Albany, Allegany, Broome, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Chenango, Columbia, Delaware, Dutchess, Erie, Essex, Genesee, Greene, Herkimer, Livingston, Madison, Oneida, Onondaga, Orange, Otsego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Schoharie, Schuyler, Seneca, Steuben, Sullivan, Tioga, Tompkins, Ulster, Warren, Washington and Wyoming Counties - 1 per day
