By James L. Emery Rmery Reminds Employers of New Quarterly Wage Reporting Requirement

Assemblyman James L. Emery (R-Geneseo) has issued a reminder to all employers, particularly farmers, of a new quarterly wage report that must soon be filed with the State Tax Department. Emery said:
"Farmers, who have not previously been required to file employee reports with the State Tax Department, should be aware of the October 31 deadline for quarterly employee wage reports man dated by a new state law."

The new law is almed at im-

The new law is almed at Improving the state's ability to discover ineligible recipients of social services payments by making poss-ible a cross-check on applications for welfare with employee wage

for welfare with employee wage records.

Reports are due quarterly and the first quarter runs from July 1. 1978, to September 30, 1978, with the first report due as of October 31, 1978. Even though farmers are not required to file tax withholding statements with the State Tax Department, they must still comply with the quarterly reporting requirement of the new law. The law states that every employer must submit quarterly reports of all wages paid for each employee who resides or is employed in New York State, whether or not those wages are subject to the withholding of tax. The quarterly reports are to be made on form WRS-2 and must include the employee's name, Social Security number and gross wages. No tax payments are due with these reports and reporting forms are available through the State Tax Depatt

number and gross wages. No tax payments are due with these reports and reporting forms are available through the State Tax Department or its district offices.

The Tax Department has set up an Albany telephone number to answer questions relating to the quarterly reporting requirement. The number is (518) 457-2683.

When the new quarterly wage reporting law was being debated in the Assembly earlier this year, I supported an amendment which would have required the Tax. Department to share information from existing tax records rather than requiring separate quarterly reports. If enacted, the amendment effectively would have excluded farmers from the reporting obligation and lessened the paper work required by the state for all other employers who must already file separate annual tax withholding and wage reports with the State Tax Department.
