The Greenwood Town Board held their September meeting on Monday night, Sept. 18. Tuesday night, October 31, was set as the Official Halloween Trick or Treat Night in Town. Hours will be from 6 to 10 P. M. Robert Malin, Town Constable, reported the Town will be well patrolled that night with Bob Studer and Ray Duke acting as Auxiliary Police to assist the Constable. Phil Patti, Attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nye, appeared before the Board to learn the status of the reopening of the Rogers Road. Supervisor John Helgerson stated that Henry Burke Town Attorney, has had papers served on Neil McCormick, so instituting legal action on behalf of

"Inside The State Capital"

In a one-day looting of this state's taxpayers which makes Attila the Hun look like Little Bo-Peep, Governor Carey and his Merry Band of Irresponsible Democrat legislators rammed through a so-called Supplemental Budget of \$225 million, when all is said and done. Don't be fooled that it will only cost \$83 million in new cash outlay for this fiscal year. Before they are through the Carey Administration and its advocates in the Legislature will have robbed this state's treasury of \$71 million for state operations, \$23.3 million for local assistance and \$119.9 million for capital construction projects, over a period of several years.

There's nothing new about the sham which has taken place in this Legislature over the years concerning the Supplemental Budget which is supposed to be a vehicle for including "necessary" funding left out of the regular State Budget passed earlier in the year. However, the manipulation and porkbarrel spending of this fiscal procedure which has taken place since Carey took over the Governor's office and the Democrats took over the Assembly now surpasses greed and borders on the ridiculous.

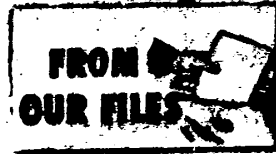
Mr. Carey just can't seem to get it through his head that the people of this state have had it with spending more and more and more every time they turn around. Does he really think that he and his Democrat friends in the Assembly can fool the public in this day and age by touting some meager and nearly meaningless tax cut a few months before election and then have the nerve to pop up six weeks before Election Day with a tray of goodies which may satisfy a few people here and there where Democrats need the votes? With the money being spent in this Supplemental Budget, state spending under Carey is now pushing \$12.5 billion. It was \$9.5 billion when he became Governor nearly four years ago.

So who's fooling who? If our citizens had the time and the expertise to sift through this "magical" 330-page Supplemental Budget bill, they would find "goodies" to rival last year's package of fun which included \$60,000 for the Brooklyn Boys Choir; \$1,000,000 for Governor Carey's new plane which he is now using to fly around the state campaigning and \$88,000 to study sheep in Barbados. This year, despite the uproar over the cost of education in this state, \$10,000 is earmarked "travel funds increased to enable the Regents and their committees to fulfill fundamental responsibilities"; \$90,000 for the Youth Guidance Bilingual Center in Brooklyn; \$220,000 for the Brooklyn Educational and Cultural Alliance; \$10,000 for a feasibility study of an ice rink on Staten Island; and \$700,000 to build escalators at 4 railroad stations in Queens and Long Island, to name just a few.

The startling remarks of the Democratic Chairman of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, Arthur Kremer of Long Island in a recent news story, sum up the situation well. Mr. Kremer, who helped prepare this budget, said "Traditionally, the supplemental budget has been a Christmas tree for the members." He also noted that one-third of the budget projects or even more might never be undertaken. The question is, then, what is this budget? A fiscal document or a political plum? The answer is clear.

These same Assembly Democrats who voted so eagerly in favor of the Supplemental Budget allowed their leaders to conveniently kill an amendment to the budget which would have meant a \$250 million tax break for our citizens. The parliamentary maneuver which prevented this tax cut legislation from coming to the floor for a vote, was simply a convenient and oft-used procedure to keep upstate Democrat legislators from having to make that terrible choice between going against the wishes of their leadership or voting against tax cuts for their constituents.

What we needed right now, if indeed there is any surplus money around, was a significant tax cut which would aid our residents particularly property owners and our elderly. What we got, unfortunately, was more and more state spending contrary to the wishes of
