The Apostle Paul in writing to the Church at Rome in Verse Two of the Twelfth Chapter of the book of Romans says, "Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds, that ye may prove what it good and acceptable and the perfect will of God"!

To understand the meaning of this scripture, one would need to understand the main meaning of two important words, in this verse. The first, being conformed meaning to fit into the pattern of the world, and the second as we read it transformed, meaning to change the inner pattern.

Underneath it all comes the thought, we are not to expect to be lead by the world's spirit, but by God's; not to be one of the gangbut to stand against the crowd when it is wrong, and stand for God when it is right.

First Abraham, we could say had a rather easy life, under God's guidance. It would have been a natural world reaction to have said. But God said to go and Abraham followed this command, and said no to an easy life, and chose to follow God's command, and went not knwing whither he was going.

Then we find Moses, you recall, as a baby was found in the bull-rushes by the daughter of Pharoah's servants and was taken in and adopted by her and was raised in the palace of the Egyptian ruler. Yet when the wrong was being done to His own people, the Isrealities, he stood up, and chose to go by God's way and command to lead them, saying no again to an easy life in the palace of the Tharoain.
