Plans for a new gym were approved by the Education Department at the September 11th meeting of the Board of Education here in Andover. It was decided to postpone any action of the gymnasium for an indefinite period of time, because: 1. The State Aid which was received was not as much as was hoped for. 2. Since the budget did not pass, the Board was reluctant to ask the townspeople for their support.

For now, Mr. Jordan stated that the school needs a repair bond issued to repair the roof over the old gym and to replace the roof over the new addition. Some of the windows in the new addition have rotted and need replacing. Also, the heating, plumbing, and electricity are all in need of repair. The interclassroom intercom (or classroom telephones) do not function properly. Cement work is needed on the walkways and steps. The parking lot needs to be extended, and the driveway repaved.

The Board has two years to bring up the vote again on the gym. Mr. Jordan stated, "I'm just not sure what the Board is going to do over the next two years."
