

Village Board Holds Regular Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday, September 11th at 7:30. Present: Ralph A. Allen, Mayor; Howard McAndrew, Karl Graves, Ann Appier and Charles Dain, Trustees.

Minutes of the meeting held August 14th were read and approved on a motion made by Karl Graves and seconded by Charles Dain.

Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Charles Dain, to update the Health Insurance coverage plan for Village Employees by going to the 50-51 insurance plan.

Moved by Charles Dain and seconded by Karl Graves, to have a Brush and Limb Pickup on November 13th and 14th only.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Howard McAndrew, to accept the following Police Report for the month of August. Accidents 1, Assistance to other Agencies 3, burglary 1, disorderly conduct 1, fires 1, larceny 2, miscellaneous calls and requests 91, premises found unsecured 2, total arrests 11 (traffic 8, criminal 2, Village Ordinance 1). Court appearances 9, property checks 2, Chief's hours 348, Bissell 27, Litzburg 29, mileage on patrol vehicle 74,142.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier, to appoint Karen L. Graffath as Police Matron.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier, to amend the uniform policy for part time Police help, to allow for 1 replacement uniform per year, for policemen.

Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Karl Graves, for the Village Crew to notify the Mayor and Village Office when working on water lines so all consumers questions can be readily answered.

The monthly report of Superintendent Rohrabacher was discussed and placed on file.

Moved by Karl Graves and seconded by Ann Appier, to allow Supt. Rohrabacher to drive the Village pickup truck back and forth to his home on Duffy Hollow on a temporary basis until the first of the year. Supt. Rohrabacher is to check the Springs on weekends.

Moved by Charles Dain and seconded by Karl Graves, for the electric department to borrow \$5,000 from the General Account to pay the bill of the bonding attorneys and Attorney Argerianni.

Moved by Charles Dain and seconded by Karl Graves, to advertise bids on street work for East Greenwood St., East Ave., and for the sealing of Grove and Barney Streets.

The following resolution was offered by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Charles Dain, who moved its adoption:

WHEREAS the Village Electric Department operates the electric distribution system which terminates at the point of connection of service drop and consumer's service entrance cable, and

WHEREAS all electrical facilities, except meter, beyond this connection are the private property of the consumer and,

WHEREAS it is the policy of the Village of Andover to avoid all possibility of conflict of responsibility and interest, whether be it

RESOLVED that all employees of the Electric Department shall at all times refrain from the performance of inspection, maintenance or other electrical work involving the private property of all consumers.

Village Board Holds Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Village Office, Monday, September 25, 1978 at 8 P. M. Present: Ralph A. Allen, Mayor; Ann Appier, Howard McAndrew and Karl Graves, Trustees.

Bids, as advertised in The Andover News, for Street work for the Village were publicly opened and read. One bid from Allegany Bitumens Inc., was received and the following amounts quoted: East Avenue \$2,450, East Greenwood Street \$4,050, and single surface oil and stone for Grove Street \$1,250, and Barney Street \$2,650. Moved by Howard McAndrew and seconded by Karl Graves, to accept the bid of Allegany Bitumens Inc., and for the Mayor to sign and return the contract. Work will be started as soon as possible.

This concluded the business and the meeting was adjourned.

Abstract No. 4 of 7879 was audited and approved for payment; in the following amounts: General \$5,478.09, Water \$913.95 and Electric \$13,673.96.

The Mayor's Column

"Red" Allen

Well folks, we have been so busy this summer that we haven't had a chance to write up things of interest for a report in this column.

However, now that Fall is here, we'll see if we can't get back on the "beaten path". First, we have some "Good News" — and then we have some "Bad News."

Let's have the "Good News" first. We are happy to report that the new six inch water line from the Springs down to the Village Limits is completed, has passed the health tests, has been inspected and is now in operation.

The Contractor, Blades from Hornell, has been paid, and the engineering firm of Goudy & Hunt has been paid in full to September which still leave a balance of \$2,486.69 in the fund. The final inspection fee and the cost of the audit should not exceed this figure so this means that the new water line will not cost the Andover Taxpayers any money at all. This, despite all of the dire predictions by some of the members of the Community when the project was first started.

As far as the Village Street projects are concerned, the new Street surface put in on Grove Street last year has received the necessary coat of oil and stone to preserve that Street; the section of Esat Avenue between Center and Elm Streets has been resurfaced and part of East Greenwood has been fixed. This section will be completed after the Gas Company has dug up and replaced the gas line that they have planned on this Fall. When the Contractor finishes this project, the Village will still have over \$300 left from the amount that was in the Annual Budget for these repairs.

Also, according to the Annual Report on the Landfill from the Village of Wellsville, we will have several thousands dollars left over in this fund from the amount that was in the budget so that if we have no unforeseen large expenses we should be able to have enough left over at the end of the year to take care of most of the cost of the money that was borrowed to build the new garage addition on to our present electric sub-station.

Now for the bad news. In a letter from HUD (Department of Housing and Urban Development) regarding the Village application to that agency for Single Purpose Grant Funds under the Small Cities Program for Non-Metropolitan Areas, for the upgrading of the Water distribution lines and water supply as well as the upgrading of housing for Senior Citizens, we received notification that the application had not been approved as there were limited funds and the point rating that Andover received was not high enough to receive the necessary consideration.

The Village of Andover application received 242 points with the premise that the total maximum points a community could receive is 875 points.

We understand that Belfast turned in a similar application to ours and that they did receive a grant. At the present time we are trying to ascertain how large a grant they received and how many points they were given in their rating for future information and possible action.

In other areas, Village Officials have decided that there will be a Fall Pick-up of Brush and Tree Limbs around the same time as the Annual Leaf Pick-up which will probably be during the first part of November. This date will be announced later in the Newspaper so that residents can plan ahead for this after Hallowe'en.
