Supervising Principal, Donald Gooley in his recent news letter out last week, reports the reason of the big jump in school taxes this fall. The Budget approved in 1977 was higher \$345,922. In July 1977 the school received a special one time State Aid of \$70,000 for a prior building project. That reduced the 1977 levy to \$275,922 lower than the 1975 levy. This year the Board received the regular State Aid check and the levy is \$345,400. The Board tried to hold the line on spending.

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"Inside The State Capital"

Last week I wrote about the "pork barrel items" contained in the massive supplemental budget passed by the Legislature several weeks ago which I voted against. This kind of chicanery on the part of the Carey Administration and our legislative leaders simply will not be tolerated any longer by the residents of the state. It is amazing to me that so many have yet to learn the lessons of the past several years when it comes to this kind of election year fiscal hi-jinks.

There was another bill passed on that same fateful day in Albany which is a further example of how the Governor and his surrogates in the Legislature continue to attempt to fool the public. This bill authorized \$416 million in Urban Development Corporation bonding. The excuse for this legislation was supposedly to aid business development in the state.

I certainly am in favor of doing everything possible to stabilize our economic situation and to encourage business and industry to remain or relocate here. And we have had an excellent example of what can be done in that regard in our area recently with the announcement that the Sterling Homex facilities in Avon are being purchased by Raymond Corporation of Chenango County, and that eventually this will mean jobs for nearly 400 people. This, I might add, was done in great measure through the efforts of the Livingston County Industrial Development Agency which came into existence with legislation I sponsored in the Assembly several years ago.

However, this kind of progress in building our business and industrial base has no relationship whatsoever with authorizing hundreds of millions of dollars for UDC bonding, when in fact no one in the Governor's office can specify exactly what this money will be used for. It is just another election year ploy that Mr. Carey and his image makers have pulled out of their bag of goodies in time to impress the voters.

What happened to the Hugh Carey of 1975 who roared his disapproval of this state's UDC and swore that it would be banished forever? What happened to the Democrat Administration and Assembly leadership who berated the work of the UDC time and time again, calling it one of the great failings of the previous state administration? Obviously that was 1975 and the posture was right for the times. Now its 1978 - an election year - and it is time to haul out the gravy train again.

Once More Hugh Carey and the Assembly Democrat leadership has demonstrated its uncanny ability to pass legislation for hundreds of millions of dollars without specifying the use or the money. No better example of what I am saying can be found than an article which appeared on the front page of the Albany Knickerbocker News on September 28th, the day after the ravaging one-day session in Albany. The Democrat Assemblyman representing the City of Albany, is quoted in that article as saying that he had absolutely no information on a so-called "food preparation plant" slated for Albany, for which six million dollars of UDC bonding was earmarked. To quote the article, he said: "I've asked the UDC. They won't tell me. They say it's in delicate negotiations." Of course that legislator and numerous others ended up voting for the Urban Development Corporation's funds because the political risks of voting against so-called projects in their Assembly Districts would be too great to bear.

Whether or not there is still effectiveness in using the UDC for further projects in this state remains to be seen, in my opinion. However, it is a complete sham and a fraud on the public to act on such legislation at this time. To my knowledge there were no projects of the few that were listed specifically which could not have been handled either at the time the regular budget was passed last spring or at some future date after the political atmosphere had cleared.

I repeat once again what I noted in my last article. Assemblyman Arthur Kremer, chairman of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee, admitted to the press that at least a third or more of the
