Up to 10 Graduate Scholars are also selected for full time research saightments from January to August The interns receive college cradifor their work experience. If you are a matrioulated junior, scalor graduate student or an exceptional sophmore, you may apply for the 1979 Session Intern Program. All applications, recommendations, transcripts and a writing sample must be student's college l'aison Graduate Scholar applications however, should be sent directly to the Assembly Intern Program.

The State Attorney General's office has begun an effor 1) crack down on merchants who add a surcharge, usually three or four percent, to the cash price of merchandise when their customers pay by credit card.

While it is legal for merchants to give a discount for payments in cash, the practice of imposing a credit card surcharge violates the Federal Truth in Lending Law according to the Attorney General's Office. A merchant who decides to give a cash discount can avoid the surcharge trap by posting a single price for merchandise and never charging credit card customers more than that posted price. tomers price.
