An Editorial

Next Tuesday, November 7 is ELECTION DAY! True, it is a "so-called" OFF year — with no Presidential Race at stake. But, it is just as important — or more so, since the future of our State Government is at stake.

In our American process of Democracy, when we are not satisfied with the way things are being run, we, the Voters, are charged with the responsibility of making a change in an orderly and legal manner by using our constitutionally based privilege of VOTING at Public Elections. And in order to vote wisely, we must be intelligently informed about each candidate. — Not by flowery oratory, false charges, mis-leading statements or promises of "pie-in-the-sky" nature — but by cold hard facts, voting records & fiscal responsibility:

Many times we have heard people say in the past: "my one vote doesn't matter — so why should I vote?" Do you realize that in a neighboring Village in two successive elections, that a contest for Mayor or Village Trustee ended up in a tie vote — and both were decided by the toss of a coin?

Where are the basic, grass roots of our Democratic form of Government located? Isn't it a fact that the "tap root" or "grass roots" of Democracy begins with the individual voter at the Village level?

And, of course, the "backbone" of our Democratic Society lies within the framework of our so-called "Two-Party" system!

We too, firmly believe in the "two-party" system and normally, we stay clear of politics as a whole as the candidates, their motives and policies are generally know to the voters.

However, when we feel that there may be doubts and misunderstandings as to reasons, motives, etc., where the best interests of our Community and voters are at stake, then we feel it is our obligation to present

our thoughts on the matter. On the State Level, we feel that Governor Carey has failed to keep his promises to cut Taxes and reduce spending on the State level by reducing the number of State Employees. As a matter of record, he has actually created several new agencies and put many of his favorites on the State Payoll. In addition, he has seen to it that New York City has received the Lions Share of all the grants that he could whip up for them. And, despite his claims of bringing new Industries to New York State, he has driven many large firms out of the State due to his lack of foresight of necessary legislation in tax allowances and credits competitive with other States. In fact, the Buffalo area has been one of areas hardest hit by this business defection and loss of

Thus we feel tha Perry Duryea, a successful businessman in his own right, should be given the opportunity to bring some fiscal business sense into State Government and see if the economy of this great State can't be turned around and headed in the right direc-

In the race for Assemblyman, we believe that "Jim" Emery has done a terrific job in serving his constituents - no matter what party they happen to belong to. Furthermore, whenever he has been called upon to come to our area for assistance on one problem or another, he CAME HERE — not once — not twice but EVERY TIME!
