Columbia Gas Transmission Corp. will begin drilling an Oriskany sand test for natural gas on the Raymond Redman property off Route 17, West Greenwood, soon said a spokesman for the Charleston, W. Va., firm. This one of four set to be drilled in the next few months according to Harold Essex Supervising Geologist for the company. Other wells are located in

Avoca, Wheeler and in the Town of Granger in Allegany County. A well drilled in Troupsburg in July, yielded nothing. The wells will each cost the company a minimum of \$150,000 and the well in Wheeler is located on State Reformation Program Land, and may exceed \$1,000,000. Mr. Essex said this is not the same program the company will conduct next year in conjunction with the federal department of energy to find natural gas in shale formations. That project is also set to drill five wells in the Steuben County area as well as in Ohio and Maryland.

The Columbia Gas Transmission Corp., suppliers of Columbia Gas of New York, provides gas to Seneyler County, Binghamton, Corning National Gas in Coopers Plains and to Corning Glass Works. The company has a good sized drilling program in Steuben Co. The West Greenwood well (Rock Creek) is located on a fault block or a flaw in the underly rock formation, not part of the Devonian shale formation where next year's drilling will take place. Shell and Mobil Companies have drilling rights on area land acquired about eight years ago. Nov. 1977, Columbia spent \$125,000 on a 3,000 foot well in Bath that was not enough to be a productive well. The firm also them-made tests in Hornby and two wells at Thomas Corners were producing two million cubic feet of gas daily. The Columbia Gas has wells in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland and New York.
