

Emery Wins Big In Andover By Near 10-1 Vote

"Jim" Emery, popular incumbent State Assemblyman from this District, carried Andover with nearly a 10-1 plurality rolling up an impressive record of 350 votes against his opponent, Henry G. Klemana with 36 votes; carrying Allegany County by over a 9-1 margin with 8,158 to 876; and District-wide by over a 4-1 ratio with 23,623 to 5,893 for his opponent.

State Senator Jess Present carried Andover handily by over a 2-1 majority over his opponent Charles S. St. George scoring 319 to 159; and District-wide 54,772 to 29,992.

However, for Representative in Congress for the 39th Congressional District, Rev. Crispin M. Maguire narrowly beat out incumbent Stanley N. Lundine by a vote of 267 to 245. County-wide, his plurality was 200 votes and in the District, the tally was Lundine — 77,442 to Maguire — 54,601.

In the race for Governor, Perry Duryea had a 2-1 majority in Andover, but in the State lost out by less than 300,000 votes. It was a different story though with the race for State Comptroller, as Edward V. Green from Buffalo carried Andover by over a 3-1 majority and won State-wide by a comparative narrow margin.

Oliver H. Baker, 91, of Main St., Andover, died Tuesday, November 1, 1978 at his home, following a long illness.

He was born September 14, 1887 in Andover, a son of Newell and Diadama Byam Baker.

He was a lifelong resident of Andover. He was a farmer and a retired employee of the New York State highway department.

A well-known musician in the area, Mr. Baker was a member of Andover Presbyterian Church, the Wellsville Golden Age Club and the Andover Senior Citizens.

On February 13, 1921, he married Emma Moss who survives.

The total number of votes cast for Governor — 538; Comptroller — 506; Attorney General — 472; Representative in Congress — 512; State Senator — 478; Member of Assembly — 386; County Clerk — 320.

In 1976 for the Presidential Election, the total number of votes in Andover were: President — 768; U.S. Senator — 749; Representative in Congress — 872; State Senator — 873; and State Assemblyman — 737.

Thus it is readily seen that 230 more voters turned out for the Presidential Election than for the "Off-Year" Election for Governor
