Sheldon Atherton and his Second New York State Champion Future Farmers of America Dairy Cattle Judging Team in two years went to Kansas City, Mo., Tuesday through Friday to enter the National FFA Dairy Cattle Judging Contest. Team member Gary DeMunn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neil DeMunn of Troupsburg, was an alternate on the 1977 first place team. Other members are Ronald Warriner, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Warriner and Laverne Warriner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Warriner, both of Greenwood Central School. Alternate this year Michael Putnam of Greenwood did not make the trip to Kansas City.

The contest held in conjunction with the 51st National FFA Convention, is sponsored by a special project of the National FFA Foundation by the Associated Milk Producers. This team is one of 43 teams that judged nine classes of dairy cattle. Each team member was required to give both oral and written reasons for their placing of the dairy cattle classes. Mr. Atherton's FFA dairy judging teams have been placed among the top teams in New York State for several years, with his first championship team last year. He has been coaching dairy cattle judging teams for 14 years. The three boys are all sons of farmers and have worked with dairy cattle at home for several years as has Mr. Atherton. Their selection for team membership started at the local level then county and state. The Steuben County team was selected at the contest at Bath during the 1978 Steuben County Fair. The team then went to Syracuse in August to compete in the State Fair placing top among the other County teams. The trip to Kansas City is part of their award for the State Fair. Transportation costs for their flight to Mo., and part of their expenses at the Convention were paid by the sponsors of the contest.

Ronald Warriner from the Greenwood Central School FFA and County Cattle Judging Team, placed third high individual in the Future Farmers of America National Dairy Cattle Judging Contest at Kansas City, Mo. It was announced Friday at a special breakfast honoring the winning teams. Ronald who was appearing on nationally televised news conference had four perfect classes of the nine types judged. He has an average score of 47 out of 50 possible points on the oral and written reasons which he gave before the judges, telling why he had placed the classes as he did. The Steuben County Team of Ronald and Laverne Warriner and Gary DeMunn of Troupsburg tied for fourth place with a team from Indiana according to Sheldon Atherton coach. In the overall National Competition, he reported, First Place Team was Missouri; Second Illinois and Third, Colorado.

"Inside The State Capital"

New York State is likely to experience its first serious winter snowfalls by the end of this month, and skiers are already anticipating that first run down the slopes.

The preparations for the new winter recreational season were very much in evidence at the State Capitol this past weekend with the scheduling of the 1978 Snowshow in the Nelson Rockefeller Empire State Plaza. The State Commerce Department was represented and distributed copies of a new and expanded "I Love New York Skiing" brochure to those attending.

New York State has more ski areas than Vermont and New Hampshire combined, and the Commerce Department's free brochure not only provides information on 85 of them but also lists a number of package tours available at various New York ski centers this coming winter. Information on cross country as well as downhill skiing opportunities are included as are air and rail fares to and from major cities throughout the state.

More than 100 special events occurring around the state are also listed in the brochure and, based on last year's experience, the brochure is expected to go fast.

Snowmaking capabilities have also been improved at all three state-owned ski centers, Whiteface Mountain, Gore Mountain and Belleayre.

Other improvements made at the state-owned centers include the upgrading of racing trails at Whiteface to Olympic standards and a renovated ski shop at Belleayre offering new rental equipment. Skiers will also be able to use the gondola lift at Gore Mountain, the only one operating at any New York State ski center.

Details on cost, facilities, location and operating season at these and other privately owned ski centers can be found in the free skier's brochure now available from the Commerce Department.

Starting this month, consumer contracts such as mortgages, personal loans, apartment rental leases and car rental agreements must all be written in clear, every day language.

The new "plain language" law applies to consumer agreements involving less than \$60,000 and was first passed in 1977 but its effective date was delayed until November 1, 1978, to provide time for certain adjustments in the original bill. For example, it was necessary for the 1978 legislature to rewrite some portions of the law so that it would conform to requirements imposed as a condition for obtaining federal funding for such contract items as a home mortgage.

This new law, introduced by Assembly Republicans, is the model for consumer legislation now before the legislatures of other states and before the U. S. Congress. House Bill 12158, a proposed amendment to the federal Truth-In Lending Act, would require all consumer credit transactions nationwide to be written in conformance with the "plain language" requirements of the New York State Law.

One Canadian paper has praised our new law by comparing its importance to the order of King Edward III in England requiring that court proceedings be in English instead of Latin!

In any event, other states and the nation's legal profession will be reviewing our experience under the new law very carefully in the months ahead and, if the law works to the consumer's advantage as expected and without serious legal complications we may well see our law the basis for a nationwide "plain language" requirement in consumer contracts.
