Many of you people read in the papers how much it cost to operate the landfill and no doubt realize that the cost is pro-rated among the Citizens of the Village and Town of Andover and the Village and Town of Wellsville with everyone paying their own equal share. However, in the past, many people from the Bolivar, Belmont and Standards area who work in Wellsville like the "Pre-Heater", "Turbodyne" and many of the stores have actually been using the dump FREE OF CHARGE and we the Taxpayers have been paying for the cost of burying their garbage.

Naturally, if anyone did question these people they would just answer: "Oh, we live outside of Wellsville on the Bolivar Road" or the Belmont Road etc. And, without any means of identification system, they got away with it — and we paid for it!

Now, with the new sticker system going into effect in November Officials at the Landfill can keep an accurate check on who uses it and the cost of operating should drop — which will save all of us some money. And, we won't have to pay for a bunch of "Fice-Loaders".

If other Town and Villages want to join in and pay their equal share to use our facilities, this will be fine — as it is sure to lower the price per capita and save us more money.

You would be surprised at the number of "chiselers" we have in our present Society — ones that take their garbage to work and dump it in trash; people that put their garbage in trash cans along the Streets or Highways; or else throw it along the road — just to save 2 or 3 Dollars a month to spend on Beer or Booze — and expect we Taxpayers to pick up the tab for the disposal of their garbage!

Town Board Holds Special Meeting

The Public Hearing for the use of Federal Revenue Sharing money was called to order at 7:00 PM Monday, September 25, 1978 at the Town Hall in Andover, New York.

Merle Dibble, Deputy Supervisor opened the Public Hearing at 7:00 P.M.

There being no complaints for or against the use of the Federal Revenue Sharing money for the year 1979 as prepared, the following Resolution was made by James Haugh and seconded by Harry Kemp.

WHEREAS: This Town Board has met at the time and place specified in the notice of the Public Hearing on the use of Federal Revenue Sharing money and heard all persons desiring to be heard thereon.

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved that this Town Board does hereby adopt such Federal Revenue Sharing money into the Annual Budget of the Town for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1979 and be adopted and entered in detail in the minutes of the preceding this Town Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Town Clerk of the Town shall prepare and certify in duplicate copies of the Federal Revenue Sharing in the Annual Budget as adopted by the Town Board, to the Supervisor of the Town.
