

Big Wind Storm Feils Tree And **Cuts Off Power**

A severe wind storm with big swirling gusts late last Friday night felled a large maple tree on the Don Thorp property on Elm Street near the corner of Barney Street with disastrous results to the Village power lines as well as Telephone and TV lines.

The wind velocity reached its heights about 2 % m., blowing the large manter to completely blocking it. When the tree crashed to the ground it took the primary 2,400 volt electric lines as well as the secondary lines along with it. As the tree was falling it swept the telephone cable and telephone lines along also which in turn snapped off the telephone pole at the corner of Elm and Barney Street near the Francis Vickers property. The disaster was first reported to Police Chief James Grafrath shortly after 2 a. m., by a motorist who also reported conditions to Mayor Ralph A. Allen. Chief Grafrath immediately called Electric Superintendent Barry Rahrbacher who arrived on the scene with the Village Crew about 2:30 According to Supt. Rohrbacher the full extent of the damages couldn't be fully assessed until daylight but it was copyious that the tree had to be cut up and removed before repairs could be made. To add to the problems it was raining and the electric

To add to the problems it was raining and the electromates are still hot so the power had to be cut off at the pole near the Catholic Parsonage in addition; the Releybone around, crew of four men had to be called in to handle their cables and lines.

The Village and Telephone crew-worked until after daylight cutting up the fallen tree and there discovered that the darages were much greater than what could ocseen while it was dark. It was found that when the telephon pole on the corner broke it two from the three houses in the Immediate area as well as the felephone pand TV cables. And, when rounding up the materials to make the necessary regains, it was found that the Village didn't have any electric poles on hand that were long enough for Teplacements when the telephone. Company had to obtain and erect the only 40 foot pole that they had available.

Also, to add to the problems after the new pole was installed, it was discovered that another maple tree next to the one that was down had been split down, at most to the ground so this one had to be cut down and removed before the wires could be spliced to gether and put back up. Thus every time that an estimated time would be given as to what time the electric service could be restored, each new problem would add several more hours for the final completion. Then too, the weather turned much colder which made it more difficult for the repairmen to work with their hands getting to cold. Purthermore there was only room on the pole for one or two men to work up in the air on the pole for safety sake this made it take a lot longer.

By the middle of the afternoon-the Telephone repairmen had their lower wires pretty well secured & the Village Crew had to put up their high lines which included putting new cross-arms on the tor of the poles, and then splicing the wires and fastening them up to the new insulators that had to be installed. So, it was just about dark before these 2,400 Volt wires were back up and the electricity turned back on.

Then the Firemen were called on to bring a Fire Truck up with spotlights on so that the Village Crew could replace the three house services that had been torn down. This took several more flours so that if was 8:30 p. m., before this was completed and the Village Crew could leav

was completed and the Village Crew could leave the scene and go...home. .This made 18 hours.on. the scene for the three man Village Crew under very trying conditions and they are to be commended for their tenacity in sticking to their task until it was done.
