Principal Donald Gooley and members of the Board of Education held an informational meeting at the Central School, Tuesday evening to talk about the purchase of a car on state contract for the transportation of handicapped students. There is a special vote Wednesday, December 6, from 2 - 8 P. M., to authorize the purchase of a school car for a sum not to exceed \$5,500. No additional taxes are to be levied for this purpose. In the past a car has been provided free of charge from a car dealer in Hornell. This practice has been discontinued by area auto dealers. The Board could rent a car, place the route for transporting handicapped students for bid or purchase a car. The State Education Law provides that school districts taking these handicapped pupils are eligible for State Aid up to 90 per cent of the approved cost of transportation. Bids were opened by the State in Oct., and will be awarded in the middle of December.

The School Music Department will present a Christmas Concert in the Central School Gymnasium at 7:30 P. M., December 20, as announced by Principal Donald Gooley. The Junior High Band and the Senior High Band will play under the direction of Bill Domm. Also the Third and Fourth Grade Chorus, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Grade Chorus and High School Chorus will sing under the direction of Louis Petroni. The Junior and Senior Bands, assisted by members of the Marching Band are selling Pop Corn now to raise money for the organizations.

Inside The State Capital

WHEELS OF 78 SESSION BEGIN TO ROLL

As we enter the final month of 1978, the wheels are beginning to turn in preparation for the 1979 legislative session in Albany. That session will officially convene on Wednesday, January 3.

By law the Legislature is to convene on the 1st Wednesday after the first Monday in January. Since New Year's falls on Monday in 1979, the legislators will have little time to rest from the holiday season before they head to Albany for the opening gong. As usual the first day of the session will be mostly ceremonial and will include the State of the State address by the Governor. It will also include official election of legislative leaders for the year and other house-keeping business before lawmakers can get down to the task of introducing and reviewing legislation.

Actually preparations for the new session began several weeks ago with the prefiling of legislation hopefully to be considered in 1979. Prefiling of bills began on November 15 and will continue until the session begins and then filing of bills during the session will continue until a cut off date to be determined during the session itself.

The prefiling of legislation was established a number of years ago in order to give members of the Assembly and Senate the opportunity to introduce bills prior to the session when there is sufficient time to do this kind of work and with the hope that these early bills will be considered by the appropriate committees and by the Legislature in general early in the session. Such is already the case this year.

For example, legislation has been prefiled which would repeal the state sales tax on all items of clothing. Another early measure would seek the exemption from state income tax of pensions of all retired employees in the private sector.

Yet another bill has been prefiled which would require the state to notify any recipient of a state payroll or a tax refund check which has not been cashed after one year from the date of issue that the check remains uncashed. According to the sponsor of the bill, if an individual does not receive his check, misplaces or simply forgets to cash it, he is never reminded of this by the state. Since these funds rightfully belong to the individuals involved, this legislation would insure that the state make at least one attempt to notify these persons of the unclaimed property. It was further explained that the tax department reports nearly 30,000 uncashed tax refund checks are returned each year for various reasons. These checks amounting to nearly \$2 million dollars a year are returned to the state's general fund after six years if they remain unclaimed.
