"Inside The State Capital"

Now that the holiday season is upon us, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you and your family a very Merry Christmas, a healthy and Happy New Year, and joyous Seasons Greetings.

This is normally the time of year when we reflect on the past 12 months while we look forward to exciting new experiences and challenges in 1979. Personally, this is certainly the case for me and my family. And for all the residents of the 133rd Assembly District which I represent, the weeks and months ahead will mirror what we can expect of our governments—at all levels, as we enter the 1980's.

Looking back on the 1978 legislative session which finally came to an end in the early morning hours of December 8, I guess we can be "grateful for small favors", but the public certainly cannot be overjoyed with the results as a whole. Recognizing the political nature of 1978, the fact remains that woefully little of substance came out of Albany. While we can take some comfort that at least taxes didn't go up, we have barely scratched the surface of doing something meaningful for our citizens to relieve their financial burden and to make life a little more pleasant in difficult economic times.

The state's economy in general is still woefully lacking, and it seems that it always becomes a painful experience to make progress. A good example of that is the state mortgage rate increase passed at the Special Session of the Legislature December 7. This should give banks the impetus to issue mortgages on new home construction and homebuying in general, even at a higher rate. However, the provisions of the legislation are far from perfect, and once again it was passed in an atmosphere of "crisis" as the home buying and building industry in the state was in critical need of a boost.

Crime in our streets certainly has not been eliminated or even significantly reduced. However, due to some activity on the part of the 1978 Legislature, we have at least put the criminal element on notice that we are not to get up with coddling and leniency in our criminal justice system and is demanding tougher laws to protect our citizens.

The new legislative session will begin on January 3, 1979. We will listen carefully to what the Governor has to say. We will begin to put our own priorities in order and to consider what our constituents feel are the major concerns and problems of the day. On a statewide level, most of the same issues which confronted the 210 lawmakers of this state in 1978 and even in 1977 still remain. In 1979 however, it is my hope and, as far as possible, my intention to see that the Assembly gets down to business without delay and bites the bullet in dealing with those problems to which we must find solutions now.

Hopefully, at year's end, from now when I wish you all a joyous holiday season for 1979, a review of the year will have a more positive tone, and we can truly look with optimism to better times in our state in the 1980's.
